



# **RPL Exhibition Recap**

# **Transferring Photos**


- One beauty of digital photos is that you can share them "easily" with friends and the whole world.
- There are many ways to achieve this "sharing" some easier than others (email, dropbox, Flickr, iCloud, etc.).
- While "easy" on paper, my personal experience is that some of you are still having issues while sharing with me your photos (files too small, missing photos, etc.).
- Elliot Ratchik brought to my attention an incredibly easy (and free) way to transfer files: WeTransfer.



# WeTransfer

- What is WeTransfer:
  - is a cloud-based computer file transfer service
  - Free users can send files up to 2 GB
  - WeTransfer 'Plus' allows transferring without size limitations and offers features like password protection, channel customization and 500 GB storage
- Transferring files (photos) using WeTransfer is super easy:
  - visit the wetransfer.com site
  - Add the photos (files) you want to send
  - enter the recipient email address and your email address
  - click the Transfer button

# **\* Tools'' of the trade**\* Last month I spoke about how to resist the G.A.S. (Gear Acquisition Syndrome) in order to avoid spending money on items that you don't need for your photography style. \* Having said that though, I would like to mention today some of the **Must Have** or **Nice to Have** items that you should own to have the flexibility and ability to pursue your hobby at a higher level. \* If you don't have some of these items, they might be a great addition to your Holiday Gifts wish list.

# Must Have equipment

- In order to elevate your photography an
   Interchangeable Lens Camera is a must since it
   will give you the ability to use different lenses to
   capture scenes in a variety of situations.
- You might consider an entry level DSLR or mirrorless camera as your starting point.
- Decide first which lens is a must for the photos you want to take and then select the camera you can afford. Lenses are instrumental for the overall results. Remember that "you date the camera but you marry the lenses".

## Must Have equipment

### \* A Sturdy Camera Bag

A camera bag is an absolutely crucial piece of your kit. Fit is crucial for a camera bag, so definitely try it on before you buy it or at least try to order from a place that will let you return it within a reasonable timeframe so if you hate it, you can return it.

### \* Extra Memory Cards

Definitely you need more than one memory card (especially if you are shooting in RAW) and consider having a mix of large (64GB) and medium (32GB) capacity cards to protect your photos. Buy memory cards from reliable companies at reputable retailers (unfortunately "cheap" cards are quite unreliable).

# Must Have equipment

### \* Extra Battery

For an extended shooting session an additional battery is a must as an insurance that you will not have to stop since your camera battery is dead.

### \* Circular Polarizing Filter

A circular polarizing filter is a must have. It can help you control reflections, add drama to otherwise-washed-out skies, and even cut down the amount of light coming in should you feel like using a wide aperture or long shutter speed on a bright day.

A polarizing filter has effects that can't easily be duplicated with post-production.

## Must Have equipment

### \* Backup Hard Drive

Just as memory cards fail, so too do hard drives. If your computer hard drive is the only place you're storing your photo files, a crash means they are gone. The best way to avoid that is with a good backup drive (at least ITB).

A possible alternative to a hard drive, is to store your photos in the cloud using programs like iCloud, Dropbox, etc. If you have a lot of photos you will need though, to pay for the extra storage capacity.

# Must Have equipment

### \* Photo Editing Software

A Photo Editing Software is a must to really produce quality photos. If you don't have a "modern" Photo Editing Software (PS Elements, Lightroom, etc.), download the free trial version and then decide which one to buy.

# Nice to Have equipment

### \* A fast Prime Lens

Every camera manufacturer offers a fast (f 1.8 or less) prime lens (35mm for DX format, 50mm for FX format) that will be very useful if you want to start exploring new photography tasks like street photography. These lenses are relatively inexpensive (>\$200).

### \* Tripod

If you plan to do a lot of landscape photography, slow speed photography or macro photography then a sturdy tripod is a must have (even if your camera has high ISO capabilities) in order to get sharp photos.

Don't buy skimpy tripods since they will not guarantee a movement free setting for your camera.

# Nice to Have equipment

### External Flash

An external flash is a useful tool, but it is good to have a firm hold on how your camera works before you start adding even more variables.

Then, when you are feeling comfortable, you can start adding flash and getting it off your camera, which takes things to a whole other level.

# Nice to Have equipment

### \* Neutral Density Filter (ND Filter)

If you plan to do a lot of landscape photography, then a ND Filter is a must have accessory.

The ND filter is basically a filter that, placed before the lens reduces the amount of light making its way into the camera. Think of the ND filter as sunglasses for your camera.

ND filters allow you to use very slow shutter speed in daylight situations to "freeze" movements without overexposing the still elements in the photos (e.g. waterfalls).

# ND Filter result






# Going forward
